# August 6th National Night Out Picnic Substitutes for General Meeting

nce a year, BWNA convenes an allneighborhood "outdoor meeting". The venue: Wilshire Park. The date: the first Tuesday in August. It's the largest BWNA-sponsored event of the year, attracting hundreds to the picnic area just west of the covered pavilion. On the agenda: greetings from politicians, firefighters, and police officers; a variety of entertainment activities for all ages; raffle donated by local vendors; and most essential of all a veritable feast—courtesy of BWNA, local merchants, and neighbors (who bring dishes from home to share).

The fun-filled evening, beginning at 6:30pm and concluding around 8:15pm, is actually not a "meeting" at all. Instead it is an extension of a national celebration of police and firefighters united with residents to prevent neighborhood crime. Thus, our National Night Out Picnic in Wilshire Park is only one of thousands of similar events taking place throughout the country on Tuesday, August 6th. It also doubles as a replacement for the BWNA general meeting normally scheduled for the second Monday of even-numbered months.

For its part, BWNA will be setting up barbecues for the cooking of hamburgers, hot dogs, and veggie burgers, with garnishes and condiments included. Donated refreshments will also be available, and Hollywood Whole Foods will, as it has for years, provide special cakes for the occasion. Residents are encouraged to bring themselves and their families, along with a picnic snack, salad, entrée, or dessert to set out

on the community food table. Tables and chairs on loan from Wilshire United Methodist Native American Fellowship will be spread around the picnic area for your convenience by Boy Scouts from local Troop 107.

### President's Message **Summer Renewal** By AI Ellis

If spring is the harbinger of hope, then summer is its incarnation. Wishing and daydreaming give way to experiencing and doing. Warm weather and lengthened daylight lift spirits, motivate activity, and usher in a sense of personal renewal. Gratifyingly, it's been that kind of summer for the BWNA Board of Directors. Yet several months ago, BWNA regeneration seemed anything but assured.

Renewal comes in many forms. With neighborhood associations, it's all about

replacement volunteers. When volunteers move to other neighborhoods, change jobs, take on new family responsibilities, reshuffle personal priorities, and suffer debilitating health problems—all of which have happened to **BWNA Board members** this past year—the very core of a volunteer-based organization is placed in

jeopardy. Case in point: Since last August, almost half of BWNA Board positions have been vacated at one time or another, including Treasurer, Transportation and Land Use Committee chair, and BWNA representative to the Central Northeast Neighbors (CNN) Board—not to mention losses in Newsletter reporters and distributors. The attrition trickle had morphed into a vacancy flood, and recovery was no sure thing.

But hope springs eternal for BWNA on the second Monday of every April when Taste of Beaumont rolls around. Residents turn out in large numbers for a tasty meal, door prizes, and entertainment—which is precisely why

BWNA holds its annual Board elections on that particular evening: the more residents in the room, the greater the odds of attracting volunteers, right? Well, not necessarily. Two years ago, at a jam-packed Taste of Beaumont, not a single person volunteered to fill a Board position. But this year, with a smaller-thananticipated turnout, the opposite occurred: Limping in with 6 vacated Board positions, BWNA hit the jackpot with residents stepping forward to fill positions and a CPA to fill the

> Treasurer's position! (The sixth and final at-large position would be filled a month later at our May Board meeting.) In effect, not only was a leadership meltdown avoided, but the Board emerged stronger than ever.

The subsequent infusion of enthusiasm and new ideas was evident at the annual Board retreat in early June. New members were eager to

volunteer for committees and participate in the planning of events and new projects. It's a prize group of Board "rookies," and you can become acquainted with each of them in a series of Newsletter interviews, beginning with John Sandie in this issue.

But wouldn't you know it? Just when everything was going so well... and only a few weeks after our reinvigorating retreat... I receive notice of yet another Board member resignation from Michael Gray. A valued contributor to BWNA, including reporting and writing for the Newsletter on local businesses, Michael's sudden exit came as a shocker. And yet, experience teaches us that yesterday's loss

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## Letter to the Board: Community Health

Diabetes and heart disease are major health crises in Oregon. Risk for disease is increasing as a rising number of Oregonians are becoming overweight or obese (60% as of 2007). The cost is quality of life, mortality and over \$1.8 billion every year in our state alone. The stress of the recession in Beaumont-Wilshire was also apparent in a recent community survey, which uncovered a need for more interaction with neighbors. A community health center can fill this need and strengthen our neighborhood. These centers are proven solutions that have already made a dramatic impact in many Oregon neighborhoods. They provide patient centered primary care; exercise, cooking, and nutrition classes along with a community garden; family and youth outreach programs; and they can partner with organizations such as Loaves and Fishes. The shift to delivering health care through community health centers cuts costs, builds social capital, and improves neighborhood livability. Beaumont-Wilshire, because of its dedicated community leaders and neighborhood involvement, is in a position to make positive changes in many neighbors' lives. The ripples of healthy and interconnected living reach us all.

## **BWNA Recipe Box**

Welcome to a new, and hopefully permanent, addition to the BWNA newsletter: our neighborhood recipe box. We'd like to invite neighbors to submit their favorite recipes—they don't need to be original or fancy just something you enjoy making and people enjoy eating. If you have a good story or picture to go along with the recipe, send those too!

I will kick things off with this recipe for olive oil cake. First, I should confess I've never actually made this cake—my husband is the baker in the family — but I have enjoyed eating it many times. It is simple and moist, sweet but not overly sweet, and pairs really well with almost anything (fruit, ice cream, whipped cream, chocolate). It also tastes pretty good with a cup of coffee for breakfast. The recipe makes a fairly large cake but it keeps well—no need to refrigerate.

#### Olive Oil Cake

3 eggs

2½ cups granulated sugar

1½ cups extra-virgin olive oil

1½ cups milk

Grated zest of 2-3 oranges or lemons

2 cups unbleached all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

Large pinch of salt

- Preheat the oven to 350° F. Butter and flour a 12-inch cake pan (I usually make this in a 12-inch cast iron skillet – it gives a nice crisp edge and looks good). In a large bowl, whisk together the eggs and granulated sugar. Add the olive oil, milk, and orange or lemon zest.
- In another bowl, stir together the flour, baking powder, and salt. Make a well in the dry ingredients, and slowly add the egg mixture, stirring just until blended. Do not over mix. Pour the batter into the prepared pan.
- Bake until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean, 50 to 55 minutes. I let the cake cool in the skillet, and serve it from the pan. You could also let it cool completely, loosen the sides with a knife, and invert onto a serving plate (hold the plate against cake pan and flip...hopefully it will come out in one piece).

Serve with fresh fruit or anything else that sounds good. This time of year I would recommend strawberries and rhubarb or blueberries with cream. You can't go wrong. Enjoy!

## Summer Construction May Cause Traffic Headaches on Major Neighborhood Street

Work has begun on a sewer project that will snarl traffic on one of the neighborhood's busiest streets for much of the summer.

The city has hired a contractor to install a new sewer line on the portion of NE Wistaria Drive that connects 42nd and 41st avenues. This is one of the main north-south connector streets in the neighborhood and TriMet's 75 bus normally drives the street.

It will take about a month for the contractor to install the sewer line. Then crews will return later in the summer to connect 10 houses on the south, or downhill side, of the street to the new sewer. Under the contract, all work has to be complete by October 1.

During construction, traffic will be limited to one lane, with flaggers alternating through traffic. Construction is limited to 7:00am to

4:00pm on weekdays, said Cheryl Kuck, a city spokeswoman. The contractor is allowed to work on Saturdays, but that's unlikely because of the cost, she said.

It's unclear whether the 75 bus will be detoured during construction. City officials will try to maintain one 10-foot travel lane, but once the open trench is dug, there might not be enough room for buses. But TriMet officials said they hadn't heard about the project.

The work is necessary to replace a 100-year-old sewer line that's not easily accessed because it runs along the property line between the 10 houses and the houses down the hill on Stanton Street. As part of the project, the contractor will move each house's sewer lines 180 degrees so they flow toward Wistaria. The old line will be filled and left in place.

The project is one of many sewer replacements going on throughout the city. The same contractor, MEI Group or Moore Excavation Co. of Fairview, has been working on projects on NE 33rd and 57th avenues. The city has a \$6 million contract with Moore.

The new line will be a 12-inch sewer that will be about 17 to 19 feet deep and run 520 feet along Wistaria. The trench will be 4 to 6 feet wide. Residents along Wistaria won't have any disruption of their service.

City officials said they would replace any speed bumps that are removed as a result of the construction.



## Tips for Waterwise Gardening in Beaumont-Wilshire

One of the things that makes Beaumont-Wilshire such a great place to live is our beautiful lawns and gardens. Local residents also have a strong commitment to preserving the community's natural resources—and we frequently hear from Beaumont-Wilshire gardeners who are looking for new and better ways to save water while keeping their gardens green and healthy in the dry summer months.

Good news: the Regional Water Providers Consortium has some great free resources to help Beaumont-Wilshire residents do just that.

The first step is knowing how much water your garden actually needs. The Consortium makes that easy by posting a "Weekly Watering Number" (www.conserveh2o.org) that tells you exactly how many inches of water your lawn or garden needs for the week, based on the weather in your zip code. You can even sign up to receive the watering number by e-mail. Another step to reduce outdoor water use is selecting low-water and native plants, and using smart watering techniques. The Consortium offers plant guides, information about lawn alternatives and how-to videos on waterwise irrigation on the Outdoor section of their website: http://www.conserveh2o.org/using-water-efficiently-outdoors Here are the Consortium's "Top Five" waterwise tips for Beaumont-Wilshire gardeners:

Water lawns and gardens early in the morning (before 10:00am) or later in the evening (after 6:00pm) when temperatures are cooler and evaporation is minimized.

- Adjust your sprinklers so that they are watering your lawn and garden, not the street.
- Water in several short sessions rather than one long session to allow for better absorption and to prevent run-off.
- Adjust your mower to a higher setting. A taller lawn provides shade to the roots and helps retain soil moisture, so your lawn requires less water.
- Group plants with similar watering needs together, as different plants require different amounts of water.

Finally, the Consortium will offer free outdoor watering gauge kits from July 1 - August 10. The kits include a water gauge and timer to help you measure your sprinkler's water use and ensure that you're giving your lawn and garden the right amount of water. Kits are available while supplies last—one per customer—to metro-area residents who receive water service from one of the Consortium members.

Black and white hard copies are distributed to over 2600 neighborhood residences and businesses, and a color version is available online at the BWNA Web site (www.bwna.us). Residents are encouraged to submit articles and announcements (limited to 300 words) or "Letter to the Board" editorials on topics of local concern (limited to 150 words), all of which are subject to editing. Local merchants and organizations may purchase ads in two different sizes for a minimum of 3 issues, with a discount given for 6 issues. The deadline for submitting articles, announcements, "Letter to the Editor" editorials, and ads is the second Friday of even-numbered months, with the deadline date publicized in each Newsletter under "Newsletter Calendar". Articles are requested to be typed in WORD format, if possible. All submissions—ads and articles—should be submitted the day of or prior to the deadline date and sent to BWNA President & Interim Newsletter Editor AI Ellis at president@bwna.us.




